#### **Nature Notes**

On a recent short circuit round the village recently we counted five varieties of wild (hardy) geraniums. The most obvious is Pyrenean Cranesbill (*Geranium pyrenaicum*) which is the biggest of this particular group. There are lots of them along the side of the church path, with mauve flowers, up to half an inch across, with rounded and indented leaves. In the midst of low vegetation this makes lowish mound but it will scramble up quite high when it can. Then there was Soft Cranesbill (*G. molle*) with smaller pale pink flowers: this is a lower plant, tending to be prostrate and with less dissected leaves.

We then found Shining Cranesbill (*G. lucidum*) on a wall, and then in our garden: this has small pink flowers with more rounded and very glossy leaves, hence the name. There was masses of Cut-leaved Geranium (*G. dissectum*) along the edge of the rape field; this is typically an arable weed and is a bigger plant with pinky-mauve small flowers and very dissected leaves. The fifth geranium was Herb Robert (*G robertianum*), a very familiar garden weed (too familiar) and found along hedgerows too: this has bright pink flowers on reddish stems and a very distinctive sharp scent.

We have two more wild geraniums which will come out in the next month or so: Meadow cranesbill (*G. pratense*) is the largest, with large bright blue flowers at about 18". This is the plant that has been hybridized by plant breeders for the garden. It grows along the verge of the Farthinghoe Road beyond the Forceleap crosssroads. We also have Small-flowered Cranesbills (*G.pusillum*) with much smaller pale pink flowers.

Some of this family are called cranesbills because of the shape of the seed pods, which develop into long sharp points, many of them pointing upright. The plants were named at a time when cranes were seen in the countryside and everyone was familiar with their long beaks.

We wrote last month about the cabbage stem flea beetle and its effect on the rape crop, and we have since noticed that in some of the rape fields there are parts where are more weeds than rape. Shepherd's purse (*Capsella bursa-pastoris*) is doing particularly well: this is a plant with small clusters of tiny insignificant white flowers, but as the plant grows with successive flowers at the top of the growing stem the seed pods develop below into small heart-shaped packages, which presumably at some stage resembled the sort of small bag that a shepherd might have with him.

One of us does a regular fortnightly butterfly survey for BBOWT in Ardley quarry and on the last round was delighted to spot a Green Hairstreak butterfly. These are the only British butterflies with truly green colouration on their wings, which makes them difficult to find. The uppersides of their wings are a dull brown, but the undersides are bright green with a faint white streak parallel to the edges. They appear to like sheltered scrub with some open floriferous grassland, which makes railways cuttings ideal, and they lay their eggs on a wide variety of plants. We are unlikely to see these in the garden, but we have had a number of Holly Blues this spring, and a good number of Orange-Tips and Brimstones. We were delighted to see a swift or two returning, and surveying the scene, but we don't think any are nesting with us – yet. We live in hope.

### Newbottle & Charlton School Update

Term 5 is a short and busy one, with children in Year 2 & 6 taking statutory assessments. They did extremely well, showing a growth mind-set even when faced with challenging questions. We will get the results in July.

In June, Year 1 take a phonics test of words made up from small units called phonemes. English has 44 phonemes but 120 graphemes, or ways of writing them. Phonics teaches children to read and spell and in Year 1 (only their 2<sup>nd</sup> year at school) they are tested on reading the sounds in real and made up words!

We have been busy competing in cross country running this term. We took a team of 6 girls & 6 boys to Beachborough for a competition. Lottie won the whole girls race which was a fabulous achievement and both teams ran superbly. For the Brackley Schools competition, we had over 45 children run for us. They all ran well and supported each other, again Lottie was victorious in the race.

We held our own Maypole and Country Dance event recently. Children in Years 1, 2, 5 & 6 all performed a variety of maypole dances and children in Years R, 3 & 4 performed country dances. The Charlton Cherries then gave a super performance at the Maytime in the Square event in Aynho.



The PTFA has been busy with fundraising for school. At Easter we held a Child Enterprise Fayre - children are given £5 to set up their own business and make a profit selling their products that ranged from homemade noughts and crosses sets, canvas artworks and tomato plants to handmade jewellery and a variety of cakes. Overall the project made more than £1000 which will be used by school to purchase some new technology!



### Notes of the Newbottle Annual Parish Council Meeting Monday 20 May 2019 at 7.30pm

**Present** – Chairman, Councillor Andrew Woods; Councillors Linda Baker, Andrea Gladden, Adrian Kelly, Michael Loggin and Diana Sheasby and Theresa Goss (Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer).

**Apologies** – Councillor Richard Bland.

Chairman/Vice-Chairman for 2019/2020 – Councillor Andrew Woods was appointed as Chairman and Michael Loggin was appointed as Vice-Chairman for 2019/2020.

**Minutes** - The minutes of the meeting held on 18 March 2019 were agreed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

**Community Policing** – It was agreed that a buddy scheme would be investigated to give reassurance to those residents in the village, who felt vulnerable and needed support. Investigations would also be made into whether it was possible to fund a PCSO with surrounding villages.

**VAS** – There were concerns that the VAS on Farthinghoe Road was not working properly, so advice would be sought from the County Council and from the original supplier.

**Dog Waste Bin** – The Memorial Hall Committee would be asked if a new dog waste bin could be sited in the car park, next to the bin store.

**Planning** - S/2019/0836/FUL – The Parish Council made no comments on an application at Woodend Grant Road to Hinton Airfield, Newbottle for a retrospective change of use from an annexe to a holiday let.

**Bus Service to Banbury** – Contact had been made with neighbouring Parish Councils and a service would be collecting passengers from the Green Lane bus stop at 9.25am on a Thursday morning. Cost was £4 and the return journey was at 12.20pm from Banbury Bus Station. There is no need to book, just turn up on the Thursday morning.

**Playing Field Lease and Pavilion Project** – Volunteers were needed to progress the grant applications and also organise fundraising events for the project. Please contact the Clerk to the Parish Council if you could assist with this.

**Memorial Hall, Cinema Club** – The Parish Council would discuss this further when more information had been received from the Memorial Hall Committee.

**Accounts 2019/2020** - The Annual Governance and Accountability Return & Parish Council Accounts for the year ended 31 March 2019 were approved.

**Cemetery/The Link Grant 2019/2020** - The Parish Council's annual grant to the PCC, for the maintenance of the Cemetery, would be increased from £500 to £650. A grant of £150 would also be paid to fund The Link.

Feel free to let us know if you are worried that there is a problem with the cows or you have any concerns.





#### **MIDNIGHT WALK SATURDAY 22 JUNE**
